PETITION TO TERMINATE CEMETERY

NOW COMES Petitioner, Oldsmith Group LLC (“Oldsmith”) and pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. §46-4-101, *et seq.*, file this Petition seeking a court order declaring a burial ground to be abandoned and to terminate the use of, and all rights and easements to use, the ground as a burial ground, and all rights and easements and easements incident or appurtenant to the ground as a burial ground, and further, to remove the remains of those buried therein and reinter them in a more suitable repository to be obtained for that purpose before their removal from the burial ground. As grounds for this Petition, Petitioner would state and show unto the Court as follows:

I. PARTIES AND JURISDICTION

1. Oldsmith Group LLC is a Tennessee limited liability company with its principal address located at 1126 Brookhaven Commons Dr. NE, Brookhaven, GA 30319-2968.
2. Oldsmith owns certain real property located at 9634 Concord Road, Brentwood, Tennessee 37027 (the “Property”).

3. The Property contains an abandoned gravesite that has been left in neglected condition.
4. Oldsmith's current and future plans for the Property are inconsistent with the due and proper reverence for the memory of the persons buried at the site.
5. Pursuant to T.C.A. §46-4-103(b), necessary respondents in this proceeding are all interested persons who are not complainants. As defined in T.C.A. §46-4-102, "Interested Persons" is defined as follows:

any and all persons who have any right or easement or other right in, or incident or appurtenant to, a burial ground as such, including the surviving spouse and children, or if no surviving spouse or children, the nearest relative or relatives by consanguinity of any one (1) or more deceased persons whose remains are buried in any burial ground.

Petitioner obtained a geological research report. This was performed by Cultural Resource Analysts, Inc. (the CRA Report). This Report is attached as Exhibit 3 to the Complaint. This Report on page 7 identified the living descendants of individuals buried in this cemetery with most recent addresses and phone numbers. These individuals are included as Respondents in this Petition.

6. T.C.A. §46-4-103(b) states, in part, that: "Nonresident and unknown defendants may be proceeded against by order of publication, and publication, in the manner provided by law." T.C.A. §21-1-204(b) states: "The clerk shall forthwith cause a copy of this order to be published for four (4) consecutive weeks in the newspaper mentioned in the order or designated by the general rules of the court." Accordingly, and in addition to those persons named in Exhibit 3, Petitioners request that the Court cause notice to be made to all unknown Interested Persons by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in Williamson County, Tennessee, for four (4) consecutive weeks.

7. Jurisdiction and venue are proper in this Court pursuant to T.C.A. §46-4-103(a).

II. FACTS

1. On December 10, 2018, Oldsmith purchased the Morgan Property, which contains a small abandoned cemetery located thereon, from Loyd Morgan Jr. ("Mr. Morgan") with the intent to develop it.
2. Mr. Morgan was born on the Morgan Property and resided thereon for 68.5 years until its conveyance to Oldsmith.
3. As stated in his affidavit, attached hereto as **Exhibit 1**, Mr. Morgan was aware of the presence of a cemetery on the Morgan Property during his ownership and upon its conveyance to Oldsmith, but he is not related to anyone buried therein.
4. Mr. Morgan does not know who is buried in the cemetery located on the Morgan Property, nor does he know of anyone who has knowledge of such decedents' identities.
5. During Mr. Morgan's lifetime, no one has visited or maintained the cemetery on the Morgan Property.
6. Oldsmith asserts that since acquiring the Morgan Property, no one has performed upkeep on the cemetery, and it has been in an abandoned state since its purchase.
7. Oldsmith contacted TRC Environmental Corporation ("TRC") to carry out the delineation and mapping of the cemetery located on the Morgan Property. A copy of the initial report from TRC (the "TRC Report") is attached as **Exhibit 2**.
8. The purpose of the TRC Report was to map and document all grave stones and other surface traces of interments within the cemetery and surrounding it.
9. The TRC Report identified 15 grave markers, only 2 of which contained inscriptions thereon. While other cut stones were present, no lettering was visible. The 2 inscribed

grave stones were attributed to George Hunter Padgett, who died in 1883 at the age of 6 years old and was the son of Addie M. Primm Padgett and George Richard Padgett.

10. The TRC Report indicates that there are approximately 12 burials associated with the cemetery located on the Morgan Property.

11. The TRC Report indicates that the cemetery is abandoned and not maintained; “vegetative growth, including large tree roots have enveloped and knocked down some of the grave marker,” vegetation at the site includes vinca, which is often found at historic cemeteries, and the fence that appears to have, at one time, marked the cemetery’s boundaries has deteriorated.

12. To perform its due diligence and attempt to identify and contact potential descendants, Oldsmith obtained a genealogical research report for the Morgan Property from Cultural Resource Analysts, Inc. (the “CRA Report”), which has been attached hereto as **Exhibit 3**.

13. The CRA Report provides that all of the known decedents in the cemetery are members of the Primm family and George Hunter Padgett, an extended family member. The CRA Report lists the following individuals as decedents buried in the cemetery: Sarah Whitfield Primm, Nannie Lou Primm, Sally Rebekah Primm, George Hunter Padgett, John Hamer Primm, Charles H. Primm, and Jane H. Primm.

14. Although the CRA Report identifies Mr. Morgan and his family as potential descendants, Mr. Morgan has confirmed that he and his family are not related to any of the decedents in the cemetery located on the Morgan Property. Moreover, Mr. Morgan asserted in his affidavit (see **Exhibit 1**) that his son, Bryan Morgan, concurs with Mr. Morgan’s

conclusion that he and his family are not related to any decedent buried in the cemetery located on the Morgan Property.

15. As such, Oldsmith conducted a responsible investigation but has not been able to ascertain with absolute certainty, any living descendants of those buried on the Morgan Property, but has listed as Respondents and will serve with service of process all person listed on page 7 of the CRA Report.
16. Oldsmith has arranged for TRC to conduct a respectful exhumation and reburial of the decedents in a new location on the Morgan Property in the same placement configuration they were recorded.
17. TRC's proposal, which is attached hereto as **Exhibit 4**, provides that its time and materials for removal and relocation for up to 20 individuals will cost an amount of \$45,631.00, plus an additional cost of \$2,500.00 per grave removal and relocation should TRC need to disinter and reinter more than 20 individuals.


WHEREFORE, Petitioner respectfully requests that the Court:

1. Service on this Petition on all if the individuals named in Paragraph 7 of the CRA Report.
2. In accordance with T.C.A. §§ 21-1-204 and 46-4-103, enter an Order authorizing notice to all unknown Interested Persons by publication in the *Tennessean/Williamson A.M.*, for four (4) consecutive weeks. The proposed publication language is attached as **Exhibit 5**;
3. In accordance with T.C.A. §§ 46-4-101 and 46-4-104, enter an Order finding that the cemetery at issue located on the Morgan Property is unsuitable as a resting place for the decedents because: (1) the cemetery is abandoned; (2) the cemetery is in an abandoned and neglected condition; (3) the conditions and activities about or near the cemetery are

inconsistent with the due and proper reverence for the memory of the dead; and (4) possible development of the Morgan Property in the future in the area of the current cemetery is inconsistent with the proper respect and reverence due to the memory of the deceased.

4. In accordance with T.C.A. § 46-4-104, enter an Order approving the re-interment of the remains with due care and decency, consistent with TRC proposal, **Exhibit 4**.
5. For such further and general relief as may be appropriate.

4. However, Mr. Morgan provided an affidavit, see *Exhibit 1* of this Petition, confirming that he and his family are not related to any persons buried on the Morgan Property.
5. Oldsmith hired TRC Environmental Corporation (“TRC”) to carry out the delineation and mapping of the cemetery located on the Morgan Property.
6. Pursuant to such delineation and mapping, TRC’s responsible investigation was documented in the report it provided to Oldsmith, see *Exhibit 2* of this Petition.
7. Oldsmith conducted a responsible investigation by hiring CRA and TRC to research and investigate the cemetery located on the Morgan Property, but after reviewing the CRA and TCA Reports and contacting potential descendant Loyd Morgan Jr., Oldsmith was unable to identify and locate any living descendants with certainty of those buried on the Morgan property, but out of an abundance of precaution will serve all persons listed on page 7 of the CRA Report and will seek notice by Publication of all unknown descendants.

RE: Background Review and Boundary Delineation of the Morgan Property Cemetery, Brentwood, Williamson County, Tennessee

Mr. Olderman,

On May 30, 2019, TRC Environmental Corporation (TRC) carried out the delineation and mapping of the Morgan property cemetery. The purpose of the investigation was to map and document all grave stones and other surface traces of interments within the main body and periphery of the cemetery. TRC utilized visual inspection to identify marked and potential unmarked graves. The following letter report provides a brief description of the cemetery and the result of the field investigations. Additionally, recommendations for the possible removal and relocation of the cemetery are included.

The cemetery is on a 17.71 acre (771299 square feet) tract of land located at 9634 Concord Road in Brentwood, Tennessee (Figure 1 and 2). The cemetery is situated on hilltop within a stand of mature hardwood trees. The cemetery measures approximately 8 meters (26.24 feet) E/ W by 12 meters (39.37 feet) N/ S and is roughly rectangular in shape. During a visual inspection, TRC located and recorded a total of 15 graves marked by headstones and footstones. In addition, two depressions were observed which may indicate the location of unmarked graves.

DELINEATION OF THE MORGAN PROPERTY CEMETERY

Methods

TRC conducted a reconnaissance of the Morgan Property Cemetery that included a visual examination of the ground surface to identify and mark all visible monuments, headstones, footstones, and depressions with pin flags. Initially, the inspection took place within the obvious boundary of the cemetery defined by the existing grave markers. Once the existing markers were identified a systematic examination consisting of a series of parallel transects spaced five feet apart was conducted to identify any markers covered with vegetation and depressions that are likely graves. Measuring tapes were used to map the depressions, a GPS unit with sub-meter accuracy recorded the cemetery's location, and photographs were taken.

Results





Figure 3. Morgan Cemetery Location.

In total, 15 grave markers and two depressions were identified in an area that measures 8 meters (26.24 feet) E/ W by 12 meters (39.37 feet) N/ S (Figures 3 and 4). The number of makers and depressions suggests that there are approximately 12 burials associated with this cemetery. The cemetery is seemingly abandoned and not maintained. Vegetative growth, including large tree roots have enveloped and knocked down some of the grave markers (Figure 5). Vegetation at the site also includes vinca, a plant that is often intentionally planted at historic cemeteries. The grave markers that were not knocked down faced E/ W and were loosely organized into rows. A deteriorated wooden fence and barbed wire fencing wrapped around a few trees was observed. This fencing appears to have, at one time, marked the cemetery's boundaries (Figure 6).

Two of the headstones have inscriptions. Stone marker #11, (see Figure 4 for location), shows a dove carrying a banner to which says, *GONE HOME TO REST* (Figure 7). Underneath is the inscription:

George Hunter
Son of
G.R & A.M. PADGETT
BORN
June 16, 1877
DIED
June 4, 1883

Stone marker # 15, marked with the inscription, "GHP" is the footstone associated with the grave of George Padgett Hunter (Figure 8). Preliminary background research identified the parents of George Hunter as Addie M. Primm Padgett and George Richard Padgett (Findagrave.com). They both, however are buried at Spring Hill Cemetery.

Recommendations for Removing and Relocating the Cemetery

TRC recommends one of two options for the prospective development plans. The first option is avoiding the cemetery and building a protective buffer into the development plans. Collaboration with local historical societies and historic preservation groups may open avenues for creating an aesthetically pleasing natural space at minimal cost. We understand that this option is not often viable for some development projects, which is why TRC offers respectful archaeological burial removal services.

There are a number of issues to consider if it is determined that excavation and relocation of the cemetery is necessary. The size of the cemetery and the mid- to large trees covering its extent will require some additional initial steps prior to the actual excavation of the burials. Initial removal of the trees to the stump will need to take place. After tree cutting, removal of the interments and headstone can take place.

A trackhoe will then be utilized in removing the overburden down to a level where the graves can be exposed and excavated by hand. This level is usually attained anywhere between 3.5 to 5.5 feet in depth. A buffer zone around the hilltop beyond any uncovered graves should also be stripped of topsoil, up to 1.5 feet in depth, to ensure the full extent of the cemetery has been exposed. Once the area has been mechanically stripped a final determination of the number of burials present will be made. TRC will map the position of all graves exposed during backhoe stripping. This mapping effort

will aid in positioning the graves during the relocation process. TRC plans on relocating the cemetery in the same placement configuration they were recorded. The size needed for the new cemetery location will depend on number of burials found. After this time, the tree stumps can be removed under the guidance of TRC archaeologists in order to avoid any remaining associated burial remains.

The work will generate large amount of backfill dirt from within the boundaries of the cemetery. If removal and relocation is the chosen option then your plans should include provisions for stockpiling and then replacing this material, with appropriate compaction to accommodate building construction.

This letter report summarizes the results of archival and genealogical research for the Morgan property cemetery on Concord Road in Brentwood, Williamson County, Tennessee. According to the background research conducted for this project, known individuals laid to rest in the cemetery include but are not limited to members of the Primm and Padgett families of Williamson County in the late nineteenth century. There are no archival records referring to this cemetery except for one source in reference to it being the second Primm family cemetery, and there are no official cemetery records on file at the Williamson County Property Value Administrator's office or at the Williamson County Archives and Museum. Based on the known interments discovered during the archival and genealogical research, it will henceforth be referred to as the Primm-Padgett Cemetery.

Background and Methods

On May 30, 2019, TRC Environmental Corporation (TRC) conducted a background review and delineation of a small cemetery on the Loyd Morgan, Jr., property on Concord Road in Brentwood, Tennessee, that recently had been conveyed to the Oldsmith Development Group, LLC of Atlanta, Georgia (Greene and Jordan-Greene 2019). During the survey of the cemetery, 15 grave markers and 2 depressions were encountered within an area approximately measuring 8 m (26 ft) east-west by 12 m (39 ft) north-south. Two of the stones were inscribed, both of which are associated with the burial of George Hunter Padgett, who died in 1883 at the age of 6 (see below for further details regarding this individual). While other cut stones and field stones were present, no lettering was visible at that time nor during a brief visit to the cemetery during the course of the present archival research for the current project. No excavations were conducted by TRC, and they recommended either avoiding and protecting the cemetery from development, or removing and relocating it.

Oldsmith Development Group, LLC plans to develop the 7.17 ha (17.71 acres) property containing the cemetery into eight 0.80 ha (2.00 acre) lots. The cemetery is located within the building pad on one of the lots. Cultural Resource Analysts, Inc. (CRA), was contacted by you in August 2019 regarding providing archival and genealogical research on the cemetery.

The results of the archival and genealogical research are presented below. Research during a visit to Williamson County included examining land ownership deeds at the Williamson County Clerk's office, parcel mapping and cemetery research at the Williamson County Property Value Administrator's office, and extensive research at the Williamson County Archives and the Williamson County Library in Franklin and the John P. Holt Brentwood Library. A visit to the cemetery also was made in order to reexamine the stones for any signs of additional inscriptions as well as to have a better sense of the cemetery in terms of landform location and overall condition. The research in Williamson County was followed by an extensive online review of federal census records, tax lists, probate records, marriage records, death records, personal letters, military records, compiled family papers, cemetery records not including the Primm-Padgett cemetery, and a review of historic maps of the area.

Results of Archival Research

The earliest known owner of the property containing the cemetery was Charles H. Primm (Table 1). In 1860, he resided with his wife and children in what was then the Eastern Subdivision of Williamson County, Tennessee. That year, Charles was 51 years old and was listed as a farmer with \$1,500.00 in real estate and \$5,049.00 in personal property. His wife, Jane M. (née Wilson), was 43 years old. Residing with them were their children: Robert, age 21; Jeremiah W., age 18; Anne, age 16; and John H., age 14. Charles' nieces, Bettie and Mary Thompson, ages 16 and 12, respectively, resided with them, as did F.A. Bell, age 9, who likely also was a family relation (United States Bureau of the Census [USBC] 1860, Washington, D.C).

On January 30, 1866, Mary Thompson, Charles Primm's niece, married Julius S. Morel, a Swiss immigrant and veteran of the Civil War (Ancestry.com 2008). It appears that following the marriage, Charles conveyed to Julius and Mary 13 ha (33 acres) in the Sixteenth District of Williamson County. In 1870, Julius was 34 years old, and he resided with 23 year old Mary and their children: John, age 4, and Samuel, age 1 (USBC 1870). Julius worked as a blacksmith and was listed as owning \$975.00 of real estate. Simon Buck, a 30 year old African American man with no listed occupation, also resided with them. Next door to the Morels was Jane W. Hamer, age 65, who owned \$2,000.00 worth of real estate. On the same property but within a different dwelling was Jeremiah Primm, age 29, who worked as a carpenter and owned \$125.00 worth of personal property; his wife, Sarah (also called Sallie), age 23; and their children: Minnie, age 4, and William, age 2 (USBC 1870).

On July 20, 1871, a deed was drawn conveying the 33 acres from Julius Morel to Jeremiah W. Primm for \$1,000.00 (Williamson County Clerk's Office [WCCO] Deed Book [DB] 5:21–23, Franklin, Tennessee). As noted above, Jeremiah Primm was Charles Primm's son who originally owned the property, and was Julius' wife's cousin. He also had lived next door to the Morels in 1870 as noted above. The deed conveying the property from Julius Morel to Jeremiah Primm was not registered until August 24, 1874, at which time it was noted that Julius' wife, Mary, signed with her mark. Following the conveyance of the property, Julius and Mary Morel moved to the Johnson Community on Granny White Pike, where he operated a sawmill. They are both buried at Mount Hope Cemetery in Franklin, Tennessee (Chevalier et al. 2008).




Figure 1. 1878 atlas of Williamson County, Tennessee, showing the approximate location of the Primm-Padgett Cemetery (Beers and Company 1878).

A historic atlas for Williamson County dating to 1878 shows J. Prim(m) owning three dwellings along Concord Road (Figure 1). The arrow on the map shows the general location of the cemetery relative to the three Primm structures. It is not known whether the family cemetery was established by that time, but it very well may have been. In 1880, Jeremiah Primm was listed in the census as 38 years old, and Sarah (Sallie) was 32. With them resided their children: Willie, age 12; Minnie, age 13; Charlie, age 9; Irene, age 6; Staley, age 4; and John, age 1 (USBC 1880). Jeremiah worked as a carpenter. In 1882, Sarah Primm bore twin girls, Nannie Lou and Sally Rebekah, and they only lived six and seven months, respectively. Sarah Primm also died around that time, either when the twins were born or shortly after (Primm 1967). Sarah Primm and her and Jeremiah's twin infant daughters, Nannie and Sally, were most likely buried in the Primm-Padgett Cemetery on the Morgan property researched for this project.




Figure 2. George Hunter Padgett headstone at the Primm-Padgett Cemetery on the Morgan property, facing west.

On June 4, 1883, Jeremiah Primm's nephew, George Hunter Padgett, died at the age of 6. He was the son of Jeremiah's sister, Addie M., and her husband, George R. Padgett, and his is the only headstone in the cemetery that has a legible inscription. The stone marker has a banner that says, "Gone Home to Rest," and the stone is inscribed, "GEORGE HUNTER | Son of | G.R. & A.M. PADGETT | BORN | June 16, 1877 | DIED | June 4, 1883" (Figure 2). While the Padgetts did not live on the property containing the cemetery, they likely lived nearby since George R. Padgett served as a witness on the deed conveying the 33 acres from Julius and Mary Morel to Jeremiah Primm in 1871/1874, and Addie was Jeremiah W. Primm's sister. They had three other children during their lifetime: Charles Perkins Padgett (1865–1934), Hayden Henry Padgett (1867–1943), and Marvin Padgett (1874–1948). None of these children were buried near their brother in the Primm-Padgett Cemetery. Instead, Charles was buried at the Lutons United Methodist Church cemetery in Goodlettsville, Tennessee, and Hayden and Marvin were buried in the Spring Hill Cemetery in Nashville, Tennessee. Both Addie M. and George R. Padgett are buried in the Spring Hill Cemetery along with Hayden and Marvin, with Addie dying in 1901, and George dying in 1909 (Findagrave.com 2019).

On September 30, 1885, Jeremiah W. Primm, widowed since 1882, married Mary E. Conner. Jeremiah was 42 and listed as a farmer on the marriage license, and she was 28 (Ancestry.com 2008). Later that year on November 14, 1885, Jeremiah's brother, John Hamer Primm, who had married Mary Loumizer Fly, daughter of Joshua Newtown Fly and Miriam Ward Allen Fly, just a year before on March 3, 1884, died suddenly (see Attachment A for correspondence between John H. Primm and Mary L. Fly in 1883 before they were married [Ancestry.com 2012]). This was three months before the birth of his twin children, John H., Jr., and Mary M. Primm. His cause of death is unknown. According to Nettie Primm, John H. Primm, Jr.'s wife, John Primm, Sr., was buried in the same cemetery as George Hunter Padgett, which is the cemetery being researched for this project (Media Research Bureau circa 1930s). Mary L. Primm, his widow, never remarried.

In 1886, Charles H. Primm, Jeremiah's father, died, followed by his wife, Jane II. Primm, in 1891 (Findagrave.com 2019). Both of them were likely buried in the Primm-Padgett Cemetery, having continued to reside near the property that Charles owned until circa 1866. Jane H. Primm may have been the last interment in the cemetery, but this cannot be corroborated at this time.

On February 17, 1887, Jeremiah and Mary (née Conners) Primm sold their farm containing the cemetery to Robert L. Fly, who was Jeremiah's brother-in-law and the brother of the widowed Mary Loumizer (née Fly) Primm. The conveyance included approximately 14 ha (35 acres), and the land was

sold for \$1,100.00 (WCCO DB 12:98–99). Following the conveyance, Jeremiah and Mary Primm, along with the children, moved to Rutherford County, Tennessee. Jeremiah W. Primm died in 1913, and his wife, Mary, died in 1932 (Ancestry.com 2015). They were buried in the Primm Family Cemetery in Petway, Cheatham County, Tennessee (Findagrave.com 2019). John and Mary's son, Talmadge, also was buried there. Jeremiah's son, William, who he had had with his first wife, Sarah, is buried at the Spring Hill Cemetery in Nashville, Davidson County, Tennessee, and their daughter, Minnie, was buried at the Nolensville Cemetery in Nolensville, Williamson County, Tennessee (Findagrave.com 2019). The burial places of the other Primm children by Jeremiah and his first wife, Sarah, and his second wife, Mary, are currently unknown but are not in the Primm-Padgett Cemetery.

In 1900, Robert L. Fly was 37 years old, and his wife, Maggie (née Woolard) Fly, was 26. They had a 6 month old daughter named Mary F. (USBC 1900). Robert was listed as owning his farm. On November 18, 1901, Robert and Maggie Fly sold approximately 12 ha (30 acres) to John Hamer Primm, Sr.'s widow, Mary L. (née Fly) Primm, for \$1,500.00 (WCCO DB 23:189–190). It is likely that Mary L. Primm already had been living on the property before she purchased the land from her brother based on her placement in the federal census for 1900, and she may very well have lived there since her husband, John Hamer Primm, died in 1885. In 1900, Mary L. Primm was 45 years old, and she resided with her 14 year old twin children, John H., Jr., and Mary M., as well as her 19 year old sister, Suzie Fly (USBC 1900). Following the sale of the property from Robert and Maggie Fly, it is not known where the Flys moved to, but they were buried in the Woodlawn Memorial Park and Mausoleum in Nashville, Tennessee. Maggie died in 1930, and Robert died in 1950 (Findagrave.com 2019).




Figure 3. 1910 rural free delivery Williamson County postal map showing the approximate location of the Primm-Padgett Cemetery (United States Postal Service 1910).

In 1910, Mary L. Primm, age 56, resided with her twin adult children, John H. and Mamie, both age 24, and two boarders, Alex Stavcus and John H. Thompson. Alex Stavcus was African American and 24 years old. John Thompson was listed as “mulatto” (i.e., biracial) and was 8 years old. Mary was listed as a widow that owned her farm and was an employer. Her son, John H., was listed as a laborer on his mother's farm, and Alex Stavcus was a laborer on a different farm. John Thompson was listed as a house boy/servant who was not able to read or write, and he had never attended school (USBC 1910). It is very possible that the dwelling within which they resided was no longer one of the structures on the Primm land shown on the 1878 historic atlas of the area (see Figure 1), as the 1910 postal map for the area shows no dwellings near the known location of the cemetery (Figure 3).

In 1920, federal census records indicate that Mary L. Primm, who still owned the land containing the cemetery, was living in the household of her 33 year old son, John H. Primm and his wife, Nettie M. Primm, age 29. Their dwelling was on Split Log Road in Brentwood, Tennessee (USBC 1920). On October 23, 1923, Mary L. Primm died of bronchial pneumonia in both lungs (Ancestry.com 2011). She died intestate, and the land containing the cemetery was inherited by her twin adult children, John H. Primm and Mamie (née Primm) Oeser. On July 21, 1924, John H. Primm sold his portion of what was then 11 ha (28 acres) to his sister, Mamie, and her husband, Edward H. Oeser, for \$750.00 (WCCO DB 51:585). Mamie and Edward Oeser had married on September 6, 1910 (Ancestry.com 2008). In 1920, they had been recorded in the census as residing on McCall Street in the Sixth District of Davidson County, Tennessee. Edward Oeser worked as a flagman on what was listed as the Steam Railroad (USBC 1920).

On December 18, 1951, Edward and Mamie Oeser sold the 28 acres containing the cemetery to Loyd E. and Virginia (née Primm) Morgan for \$5,500.00 (WCCO DB 95:453). A historic aerial photograph dating to that year does not show any buildings near the cemetery, which is obscured in the photograph by trees and other vegetation. A dwelling was built approximately 113 m (373 ft) to the west of the cemetery sometime between 1951 and 1980, and it appears to have little association with the cemetery, except that there were signs that the cemetery had been fenced in at one time, and the occupants of the house in question may have been the individuals maintaining the fence/cemetery. On August 10, 1982, a quitclaim deed was filed in compliance with a divorce decree (Ruling No. 15126, Chancery Court) between Loyd E. Morgan, Sr., and Virginia Primm Morgan that all of their landholdings were to be conveyed to their sons, Loyd E. Morgan, Jr., and William Randolph Morgan for \$1.00 (WCCO DB 420:961–964, 421:623–626). There were three tracts, and the 28 acres containing the cemetery was Tract 1, which included the same property boundary it had when it was surveyed in 1917 during Mary L. Primm's ownership of the land.

On August 30, 1982, a partition deed was filed with the Williamson County record's office indicating that 6.94 ha (17.15 acres) of the original 28 acres was being partitioned as Parcel 2 (WCCO DB 424:990–994). This 17.15 acres contained the cemetery. The following year, on March 11, 1983, William Randolph Morgan conveyed the 17.15 acres back to his mother, Virginia Primm Morgan for \$10,219.29 (WCCO DB 436:494–496). On January 27, 1984, Virginia Primm Morgan conveyed a 3.78 ha (9.33 acre) portion of the 17.15 acres to Loyd Morgan, Jr., for \$56,650.00 (WCCO DB 469:359–361). On December 10, 2018, this 9.33 acre tract was sold together with other tracts for a total of 17.71 acres by Loyd Morgan, Jr., to the Oldsmith Development Group, LLC for \$1,771,550.00 (WCCO DB 7527:106–108).

Conclusions and Living Descendants

Based on the research conducted for this project, it appears that the Primm-Padgett Cemetery dates to the late nineteenth century. All of the known interments are members of the Primm family and their extended family (i.e., George Hunter Padgett). Specifically, the cemetery appears to date within the period of 1882–1891, although it is possible that the cemetery was being used before that time. The cemetery does not appear to have been utilized after 1891.

Individuals laid to rest in the Primm-Padgett cemetery include (in order of year of death):

- Sarah Whitfield Primm, circa 1847–circa 1882
- Nannie Lou and Sally Rebekah Primm, infant twin daughters of Jeremiah W. Primm and Sarah Whitfield Primm, 1882
- George Hunter Padgett, 1877–1883
- John Hamer Primm, Sr. 1845–1885
- Charles H. Primm, circa 1809–1886
- Jane H. Primm circa 1817–1891

Living descendants of individuals buried in the cemetery (if available, possible most recent addresses and phone numbers are included):

He is his great-great nephew by way of Charles Perkins Padgett, who was George Hunter Padgett's brother, who was the father of Addie Blanche Padgett Sweeney, who was the mother of Charles Hayden Sweeney, who was the father of Greg Sweeney.
- *Jeff D. Sweeney*, 4129 Helena Bay Ct., Hermitage, Tennessee (615-889-4384, 615-678-5384). He is the great-great nephew of George Hunter Padgett, whose inscribed headstone is at the Primm-Padgett Cemetery. He is his great-great nephew by way of Charles Perkins Padgett, who was George Hunter Padgett's brother, who was the father of Addie Blanche Padgett Sweeney, who was the mother of Charles Hayden Sweeney, who was the father of Jeff Sweeney.

That, and you come to me with a book in your hand, and I did catch you by each hand and said to you now pay if you can, and then I did kiss you and did tell you how I did love you, and you did not frown, and asked if you loved me and you did not say no, then I asked you if you would be mine, and you turned away your face for awhile but left your hands in mine, and then you look at me and our faces drew near each other, and I awoke!

Never was such a disappointment, there was no dear one, all was changed. But the question is, what does the dream mean, one thing is true about it - I do love you, and would give all that I have if the dream was true. Suppose and I was to ask you


BURIAL REMOVAL AND RELOCATION METHODS

TRC has developed the following methodology in part through consultation with the staff at the Tennessee Division of Archaeology (TDOA) and in part based on prior successful projects at historic burial sites in Tennessee. This proposed approach fully satisfies our clients' legal responsibility regarding the treatment of human remains, while providing a professional and respectful exhumation and reburial process.

Removal of the graves will be conducted using a combination of mechanical and hand excavation. Although the initial delineation will have uncovered clear signs of the grave locations, a backhoe or trackhoe equipped with a straight-edged cutting blade will be used to remove additional soil down to within six inches or less of the estimated depth of the top of human remains. All excavation below that point will be conducted by hand in order to expose the burial and any coffin remnants. Once any coffin remnants and skeletal elements are exposed, the remains will be photographed as part of the permanent project record. The excavators will also take notes with basic descriptions of the coffin remains, observations on the condition of the skeletal remains, and descriptions of any grave goods and clothing remnants included in the graves. At that point all skeletal material and associated grave goods will be removed by hand and placed in a box or boxes lined with cotton sheeting. All remains will be stored in one or more lockable steel "overseas" shipping containers temporarily placed on the cemetery property until reburial can take place.

In reburying the graves, backhoe or trackhoe equipment will excavate the reburial area to a depth of at least three feet. All remains (including coffin parts) will be placed at the base of the reburial area and the trackhoe will backfill the excavation. TRC will endeavor to reestablish as closely as possible the original layout of the graves in the new cemetery, including replacement of any associated gravestones which might be uncovered during the excavation. No further effort or costs to establish fencing, permanent landscaping, or signage at the new cemetery is included as part of our offered services and costs.

Following fieldwork, TRC will produce an illustrated abbreviated technical report on the project, summarizing the process of removal and reinternment and a summary of findings. No formal scientific analysis of the skeletal remains will be made, aside from general observations about the remains and descriptions of coffin hardware, clothing elements, and any grave goods. Copies of the report will be supplied to you and the State of Tennessee Division of Archaeology.



Project Staff and Schedule

TRC will assign archaeologist James Greene from the firm's Nashville office to direct the work for this Project. The TRC Nashville office has experience with cemetery delineation and burial removal projects throughout Middle Tennessee. Mr. Greene will be assisted in the field by our staff of qualified archaeological technicians.

Based on the current estimate of up to 20 burials within the cemetery, TRC expects the full disinterment and reinterment process to take two weeks with a crew of six working on a daily basis.

Cost Proposal

Based on the information provided by Old Smith Development Group, LLC the cemetery located at 9634 Concord Road in Brentwood, Tennessee measures 26 by 12 feet and contains up to 20 burials. This is, at best, a rough estimate as there may be more buried at this cemetery. 1. My name is Loyd E. Morgan, Jr., and I conveyed the property located at 9634 Concord Road Brentwood, Tennessee 37027, (the "Morgan Property") to Oldsmith Group, LLC, ("Oldsmith") on December 10, 2018.
2. I resided on the Morgan Property for more than ^{68.5 yrs} 50 years. I was born on the property and resided thereon until its conveyance to Oldsmith on December 10, 2018.
3. I received a copy of the Cultural Resource Analyst letter report from Oldsmith, which contains the subject line RE: Morgan Property Cemetery in Brentwood, Williamson County, Tennessee CRA Project No.: K19O001 Contract Publication Series No.: 19-687. The report summarizes the results of archival and genealogical research for the Morgan Property cemetery.
